For our third issue of A.L.L.'s newsletter, we wanted to get a little more in depth and personal with Adele to find out what she's ALL about and highlight some of her exciting events in 2010. Now 15, here's what the busy teenager shared with us.

Interviewer: You certainly had an impressive 2010! With your LOVE of books, I have to ask you first, how was the Book Expo in New York City last May?

Adele: OMG! I had a blast! This is my second time attending this expo and I had the chance to meet some really cool authors, like Jeff Kinney from The Diary of a Wimpy Kid, Mo Williams and the Duchess of York. The Book Expo holds one of the largest book expo's in the United States.

Interviewer: That sounds so exciting. What are you reading now?

Adele: Believe it or not, it's Gone with the Wind. I saw the movie a long time ago, and the book, as usual is totally different, but I still love it!

Interviewer: I definitely would not have guessed that Adele. Now you know I have to jump right to you being recognized on "Black Girls Rock" on BET back on November 7. Can you share with your readers what you were recognized for and how it all came about?

Adele: Yes! I and four other girls under the age of 30 were the recipients of the M.A.D. Black Girls Award. M.A.D. stands for "Making a Difference" and I was fortunate to meet and network with a slew of people. Some of these people were Ms. Ruby Dee, Raven-Symoné and Keke Palmer. And during Fantasia's performance, she ran right by me!

Interviewer: WOW – you had to be on cloud nine. I know the show was taped earlier, so how did you celebrate the evening it was aired on television?

Adele: My family and I hosted a Black Girls Rock Party with our family and closest friends. The female party was upstairs and the guys had their party downstairs in our basement. Everyone was screaming each time they showed me on television. We had so much fun and it was touching to have so much love and support surrounding me.

Interviewer: Some of your readers may not be aware that you are the 2010 State Title Holder and the Nation's Silver Medal Winner for ACT-SO in Entrepreneurship. You are just so busy. Can you tell us a little about that experience?



Adele: I would be happy to. The NAACP's ACT-SO (which stands for Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics) is a year long achievement program among African-American high school students. Students can compete in 26 categories students and for the state completion I competed in Performing Arts Dance, Oratory and **Business** Entrepreneurship. Winning title the state for April Entrepreneurship in afforded me the opportunity to travel to Kansas City, MI in July and compete against 16 other state winners in that category throughout the country; which I was selected the Silver Medal winner. My presentation was on my nonprofit organization, Adele's Literacy Library[®]. It was really exciting. I also attended a few workshops offered during the national competition. My godmother was my chaperon and we had a blast.

Interviewer: You are truly inspirational Adele. Are you competing in ACT-SO in 2011?

Adele: Yes, I'm looking forward to compete again in Entrepreneurship.

Interviewer: And I also understand you won a Twinkie Award in 2010 too?

Adele: Yes I did. On June 19, my mother, Aunt Tina and I went to New York City where I was being recognized along with other recipients and I won in the category of Best New Product Idea for Adele's Literacy Library[®]. The winner in each of the 5 categories won a personalized briefcase. It was a fun evening and we ALL had such a good time.

Interviewer: I know your entire family has to be so very proud of you and your accomplishments Adele. Plus, you have to be proud as well. What is your favorite subject in school?

Adele: English, it allows me to read books that I may not have selected to read on my own and it gives me the opportunity to write as well.

Interviewer: So you like writing? What do you write?

Adele: I like to write poems and I aspire to one day write my own book. I currently keep a journal too.

Interviewer: If you could have dinner with any author who would it be?

Adele: Hmmm – that's a difficult question. I like so many different authors that it's hard to pick one, but if I had to it would be Stephanie Meyers because her books are all based on her dreams and I really would like to ask her what does she eats before going to bed.

Interviewer: Where do you see yourself in 10 or 15 years?

Adele: I'll be 25 – WOW that's old! Hmmmm, well I will be in school getting my MBA and when I'm 30 – OMG... that is soooo old!!!! Well ALL will have been expanded and the rest, I'm not sure but it will be good. **Interviewer:** If you had one wish, what would it be?
